THE CANADIAN DRUM CORPS ASSOCIATION JUDGING

In order to make the show more enjoyable, a few details of the duties of judges and officials will be described.

On the field you will see a group of men who, to your mind perhaps, seem to be in the way of various units while they are doing their show. These men are the judges. There are nine of them, and each one has a particular job to do.

MARCHING AND MANOEUVRING

There are two judges for Marching and Manoeuvring. No one could be more exacting than these men. Any slight error in the drill, intervals between men, distance between ranks or sections, or line dressing, is penalized one-tenth of a point. These men are trained to see the slightest error, many of which are not noticed by spectators.

BUGLING

There are two judges for Bugling. These men are picked for their ability to detect the slightest imperfections in tone, musical accents, proper musical blend, as well as to rate the quality of the music. They also watch the handling of the instruments and positions while playing and marching. One-tenth of a point is the penalty for each bad note or lack of precision or uniformity in any way.

DRUMMING

There are two judges for Drumming. Angle at which the drums are carried, uniformity of height, position of drum-sticks are watched at all times. Each drum rudiment which corresponds to the musical note of the trumpets must be done to perfection. Attack, release, contrast, diminuendo and crescendo are all tonal requisites of a good drummer. Any time he errs in any of these departments, he loses a tenth of a point for his unit.

GENERAL EFFECT

There are three judges for General Effect. Showmanship is a vital part of a competition. Located in the grandstand at suitable points are three "G.E." judges. These men evaluate the overall effect of each unit from the standpoint of the seasoned spectator. They judge the smoothness of execution of the drill, the general temper of the bugling and drumming, the action of the drum-major, and the Colour Guard. They consider whether the manoeuvres are simple or complex, whether they are properly set to the music, and whether the whole show of the particular corps has the harmony, co-ordination and polish it should have. They score each corps accordingly.

The task of the General Effects judge is a difficult one, and demands a capable man.

TIMING

There are two timers.


A gun is fired at the first step from the starting line, or at the first note of music. Each unit must be on the field from eleven to thirteen minutes. A warning gun is fired at eleven minutes and the corps is checked when it crosses the finish line. If a unit is over or under time there is a penalty of a full point.

The painstaking and conscientious work of the judges such as we have to-day, has had the effect of producing better music and drill each year. They are to be highly commended.

THE CADETS OF GARFIELD, New Jersey. The Garfield Cadets are one of the oldest and most well known Corps in America. Organized in 1934 as The Holy Name Cadets, and reorganized in 1958 as The Garfield Cadets, the Corps has been in continuous operation for a period of 28 years. They are the present NATIONAL CHAMPIONS OF THE AMERICAN LEGION. This title they have also held in 1940, '48, '49, '50, '53, '57, '60 . . . a record unmatched in Drum Corps competition.




ST. JOSEPH'S OF BATAVIA, N.Y. This Corps was founded in 1931 by the Rev. T. Bernard Kelly, Pastor of St. Joseph's Church in Batavia, St. Joseph's was strictly a parade Corps until 1956, when its Directors began a gradual, concentrated program toward developing the caliber M&M Corps before you today. This Corps is the 1961 New York State V.F.W. Junior Champions.



ST. CATHERINE'S QUEENSMEN OF ST. ALBANS, N.Y. The Queensmen were organized in 1954. They won the New York State American Legion Jr. Championships in 1955, '56, '57, '58, '59, '60 and '61; The Greater New York M&M Circuit Championships in 1956, '57 and '58 and are now considered one of the top Junior Corps in the United States.



ST. CATHERINE'S QUEENSMEN OF ST. ALBANS, N.Y. The Queensmen were organized in 1954. They won the New York State American Legion Jr. Championships in 1955, '56, '57, '58, '59, '60 and '61; The Greater New York M&M Circuit Championships in 1956, '57 and '58 and are now considered one of the top Junior Corps in the United States.



DE LA SALLE DRUM CORPS. This Corps is sponsored by De La Salle College "Oaklands" and was founded by the school in 1910 as a Bugle Band. It reached the peak of its fame in the late thirties and forties with its famous Blue and Gold uniforms, 100 bugles and 50 drums.

Del switched to M&M in 1958. 1961 was its best year, when it defeated the Canadian Champions, Toronto Optimists, on three occasions, only to lose out in the Championships by 1/20th of a point.

That year they won both the Ontario and Junior "B" Championships. In 1960 they entered Jr. "B" M&M class and again won both the Ontario and Jr. "B" Championships. 1961 saw the Corps increased in size and entering the Junior "A" Class.
