Toronto, Oct. 31---The Toronto
Optimists Drum Corps wound up their
1964 Season tonight in the third
Annual Corps' Banquet in The British
Columbia Room of The Royal York
Hotel, the home of their Sponsor.

At the head table were Richard

Boehnke, transportation director; Al Peczeniuk, tteasurer; Andy Henderson, drum major; Doug McPhail, drill writer, Ivor Bramley, drill and guard instructor; Lorne Ferazutti, drum Instructor; Barry Bell, music director and bugle instructor, Don Daber, corps' director, Jim Karswick, corps' committee chairman; Bert Alexander, President of the Optimist Club; Harold Coulson, Boys' work chairman; Al Baggs, Club-Corps representative; Ray Leonard, M&M Judge, C.D.V.A.; Bill Shepherd, general manager, Whaley Royce and Company, Canada's foremost Bugle manufacturers.

The Dinner was opened with Grace and a Toast to The Queen by The Chairman, Jim Karswick. The Corps and their guests then enjoyed a dinner of roast chicken, with all the trimmings. Following the meal, and while coffee was being served the Chairman introduced Mr. Baggs who introduced the speaker of the evening, Ray Leonard.

Mr. Leonard opened his speech by reminding the Corps that the evening was "trick or treat" night and he wasn't sure if he was invited as a "trick" or a "treat"....the subject of his talk was the Growth of the Judges! Chapter, and as one of the first Judges in the CDCA he was well qualified to give an outline of the very interesting history...back in the 1950's when about the only contest of the year for the few Corps around was the Waterloo Festival. The M&M part was marching up and down the field once while the Bugle Judge sat on the field under a tent and dictated their comments on each Corps to a secretary-stenographer; these were then typed out on a sheet and signed by the Judge and the results dictated if the Corps won a medal at the Contest. He then outlined the growth and complexity of judging over the dozen years when the number of contests grew from one to thirty-seven...the early uniform; early comments on uniforms; the change to the present uniform; ... the responsibility of the Chief Judge at each Contest...the earlier years when the American Judges' Chapter was the yardstick for the Canadian Chapter to today when many of the American Chapters are getting ideas from the CDCA Chapter.

Mr. Leonard then went on to give his impressions of the Optimists' Corps over the years and an outline of what happens after a contest and some of the more amusing moments of different Judges, as well as the serious side. As a sideline, Mr. Leonard told of his first meeting with Barry Bell, when Barry was a bugler in the Western School Corps. Barry was given the opportunity to reply when he thanked Mr. Leonard for speaking at the Corps' tinner.

Andy Henderson, the Drum Major of the Corps, then made a presentation of a special letter opener, bearing the Corps' crest, to Mr. Karswick, the 1965 Chairman of the Optimists Corps Committee. He hoped Mr. Karswick wouldn't have to open too many bills with his new opener.

In reply Mr. Karswick told the Corps he enjoyed working with them during the few months he has been Chairman...he recalled impressions of the Corps gathered on the trip to Shawinigan in September and outlined some thoughts of the 1965 year including plans for a matched set of chrome bugles.

Mr. Karswick then introduced the President of The Optimist Club, Mr. Bert Alexander, who gave a very interesting outline of his impressions of the Corps, the relationship of the Club to the Corps, the difficulty of first getting the Club to take the sponsorship of the Corps in 1955...his impressions of Corps at contests and the pride of his Club in their Corps that has won 7 consecutive Championships.

Mr. Alexander then presented the Corps Five Year Rings to Andy Henderson, Doug MacKenzie and Roman Perohanycz.

Immediately following Mr. Alexander's presentations, Barry Bell made a presentation to Bill Holloway in recognition of his perfect Corps' attendance through the Corps year, a record that had been matched in the past but not in recent years.

Mr. Harold Coulson, the Chairman of the Boy's Work Committee of the Club took the opportunity to remind the Corps that there were now about 19 Optimist Clubs sponsoring Drum Corps in Canada and the United States ... the responsibility of the Club to the Corps and in turn the responsibility of the Club.

Before the presentation of the Certificates to each section of the Corps, by their Instructors; Don Daber, the Corps Director said a few words and reminded the Corps of six reasons on why 1964 was a remarkable Year (both pro and con) and why great things were expected in 1965. Ivor Bramley, the Guard Instructor then presented the 1964 Membership Certificates to the Guard and at the same time Mr. Karswick presented each member with a momento from the Optimist Club...attractive tie-tacks featuring the Corps' Crest. Following his presentation, Ivor thanked the Guard for their hard work during the year. He then introduced Lorne Ferrazutti, Optimist's "Man about Drums".

Lorne surprised many by making about the longest speech of his career before he presented the '64 Certificates to the Drum Line. Lorne reminded the Corps about the real problems in the drum line in October of 1963 when some of the top drummers left the Corps and Lorne had to go "deep into the bench" to replace them. The results even surprised him... "from an almost new drum line the result was one of the best drum lines to listen to and for G.E., and enthusiasm and 'get the job done' they went all out..."

Following Lorn's presentations, Ron Kaiser, the sergeant of the Drum Line presented Emilio Russo with 1965 Rudimental Bass Sticks.... for which Dave Watt remarked---"Blessed Sacks' old pair..."

Following Ron's presentation, Lorne introduced one of the best "Mus-Horn Instructor" around, Barry Bell. Barry reminded the Corps that he and several others were 'let down' last year (1964) but he looked forward to the best turnouts in the remainder of 1964 and '65 and 'semi-fanatics' throughout the whole Corps, for 1965!!!

TORONTO, NOV. 17--- The Toronto Optimists took top honours here tonight at the second annual Canadian Individual Champion-ships. TERRY McKOLSKEY took top marks in the Jr. French Horn Class and with GORD ROBERTS also captured the French Horn Duet Class.

In solo Baritone DAVE WATT came first. Optimists also took top in Bugle Quartette. In the drumming section MARK WICKEN repeated his win of last year with tops in tenor drum and high Jr. drum of the evening with a score of 90.0.

The big surprise of the evening was the defeat of RON KAISER in the Individual Snare section. In the drum quartette section De La Salle came first with York Lions first in the solo snare.

Doug Gibb of Sarnia Sertomanaires took a brilliant first in the solo soprano class with top bugle score of the evening.

G.C.C. Begins 5th. Year of Publication!

With this issue of GCC and the new "fold-over" format..Green Capsule Comments begins its fifth year of publication and looks forward to receiving its five year ring next September. Begun as a monthly newsletter in December of 1960 for the information of the Corps, it has since expanded to include the Optimist Booster Club under the direction of its present Director, Al Peczeniuk.

G.C.C. was one of the first Corps papers in Canada and holds the distinction as one of the longest running papers. It is now published every second month and is available outside the Corps at \$2.00 per year.

News around and about....THE AMERICAN MOTORS CORP. of Brampton is seriously considering sponsoring a Jr. Corps in that city as a public relations deal for the youth there....THE SHRINERS of Toronto were looking closely at the major Contestsin the Toronto-Hamilton area through the summer and must have been very impressed as they are going very BIG TIME in their first major senior Contest of 1965 at the CNE when the Shriners will feature top Canadian seniors VS. THE SUNRISERS of Long Island, possibly The Brigadeers of Syracuse and after a 1-o-n-g absence from Canada The FABULOUS CABALLEROS. This is the big June kickoff event. Will this mean the INTERNATIONAL PAGEANT of Hamilton will be bypassed or overshadowed this year?????

While many local Corps do concerts here THE OPTIMISTS will possibly shoot down to CHICAGO in February for the big DCW Lyric Opera House Concert in February....first local concert of the season is due in Port Credit the evening of December 12th. at the Port Credit secondary school there...it is sponsored by CANADA'S MARCHING AMBASSADORS who will feature as guest Corps YORK LIONS.

As almost everyone 'round here knows now HAMILTON CONQUEROR is no more and will blaze forth come spring as THE HAMILTON CADETS with new uniforms, new music...the NEW look. Most of the Corps held intact and the Corps started on their new music and DRILL immediately following the International, Sept. 20th...right now they are ahead of the game on most other Junior Corps in Canada. Throughout their short history THE CONQUEROR have had their share of bad breaks, especially at early major Contests...like The Nationals in Waterloo when they were late for the starting line because of confusion get*: ting through the pass gate. There were many other instances...lets hope this "jinx" doesn't follow the new Cadets.

In the senior scene, understand there are some "problems" in Royalaires ...but then this "rumour" is strong about this time ebery year....DON CHISHOLM out as Commanders Drum Major...O'Hallorin in????....AMBASSADORS and COMMANDERS representing Corps in the Grey Cup Parade....also St. Johns representing their home town...all Corps in paid a fee to get in.....Corps records around include

the fast selling Optimists, Canadian Commanders, York and just released...
DeLaSalle. Coming soon---The Sertomanaires and possibly Royalaires.

NEW EXECUTIVE APPOINTMENTS IN TORONTO OPTIMISTS CORPS

Toronto, Dec.2, 1964---Don Daber, the Director of the Toronto Optimists Corps announced three new appointment to the Corps Executive for 1965.

Richard Boehnke was appointed as assistant Drill Instructor, working with Ivor Bramley. Richard was a member of the line, on bugle, in the Corps of 1962. During the 1963 and *64 Seasons he served on the Executive as Transportation Manager and assistant to Barry Bell on bugles. During the indoor music rehearsals Richard will again assist Mr. Bell with the bass horns.

Dave Johns takes up the position of official photographer in the publicity department as well as working on publicity for the Corps. Dave has spent the past seven years in drum corps, spending his last three years with the Optimists. Dave is a graduate of the Ontario College of Art and is employed in the art department of a display studio in Toronto.
