

Optimists close Ontario Place for 1972 season: On Saturday afternoon, October 7th the Optimist Jr. Corps performed at Ontario Place, the 28 million dollar showplace at the CNE waterfront. As you can see from the picture above, huge crowds were present for the closing thanksgiving weekend.

VISION '73...On Saturday, October 7th a cold wind blew across Lake Ontario right at Ontario Place that kept the expected crowds down to a minimum for the three day Thanksgiving weekend holiday. The corps was at the Ontario government showplace most of the afternoon and took advantage of the day outing with an evening reception and meeting in the Ontario Room of the Lord Simcoe Hotel for the presentation...
"Vision '73"...an outline of the aims and objectives of the corps for the 1973 season. The conception "Vision '73" was conceived and presented to the 1972 corps, recruits, parents and friends, by music director Paul Thompson who outlined a 10' page report covering..."Vision '73...aims & objectives"... "Vision '73...Administration"..."Vision '73...the Show"..."Vision '73---Fund Raising..."Vision '73 Concert!"
"Vision '73...Discipline"..."Vision '73 Recruits!"..."Vision '73, Contract"

At the close of Mr. Thompson's 2 hour presentation the corps members and recruits were given copies of the 10 page presentation to take home and study.

The four soprano soloists in the 1972 show were featured as follows: Peter Byrne, Jim Farell and Bob Beachin, as the closing trio in "Paint Your Wagon."

George Nasello was featured in the intro to "More & More" The 'ad lib' solo in "More & More" showed off the talents of Peter Byrne. In concert, "Caravan" again featured Peter. The "Tuxedo Junction" screech featured Jim, Bob and Pete. Then there was a duet in the colour presentation of "Patton" featuring Bob and Pete. The solo in "Superstar" again featured Peter Byrne as did the finale number. The finale 'screech' featured Bob, Jim and George.



BOB BEACHIN:

Bob is one of our members from
the "Garden City", St. Catharines and whereas many of the corps just have to go 'down the street' to rehearsal,
Bob has to hit the highway almost every rehearsal call. The Beachin
family is well known in drum corps circles in Canada as they have been
directly involved in drum corps activity for many years, going back to
the Chessman drum corps in St. Catharines, and earlier than that, the
Grantham "Police Boys Corps" in the early '60s.

Bob joined the Grantham corps at the age of 8...his older brother Richard was already a member of the corps. When the Grantham corps was disbanded and the Chessmen were formed, Bob continued playing in the soprano section with them. In 1969 he joined the Optimists.

What does he like about corps? "Just being with a great bunch of guys...including you, Ring...I mean Richard..."

What aspect about corps does he dislike? Would you believe, long bus trips!

PETER FREDERIC CARLYLE BYRNE:

Another member of the corps from St. Catharines, Peter is at present going to York University where he is first year in the music faculty. In addition to playing in drum corps has also worked part time as a professional musician playing in everything from rock bands through Tijuana Bass and right up to the St. Catharines Symphony Orchestra. All 3 of Peter's brothers were in drum corps...David, now a social worker, played contra with the Optimists in 1966 and 1967...Brian, a hotel manager, played french horn with the Optimists in 1966 and '67 and Mellophone in 1968 and '69. John played one year with the corps on soprano in 1971.

Peter first heard of drum corps when the Grantham Corps started practicing just down the street from his home and Peter joined the street gang that visited the rehearsals regularly just to throw rocks at the corps. But by the time he was 11, Peter stopped throwing rocks and joined the corps in the 3rd soprano section.

In 1966 Grantham and the Denis Morris Majestics amalgamated to form the Chessmen and Peter played with them for three years moving up from 3rd position to lead. In the fall of 1968 Peter joined the Optimists. Grantham folded shortly after. Peter was

15 at the time. Some of his highlight memories of the corps?...

"I remember the first time I put on the Optimist uniform in 1969. We sang the corps song. It was only some crumby exhibition in Batavia, but I just about

cried! I guess I just didn't believe the whole thing."

"...Then there was the '69 Nationals in Ottawa. It may not seem like a high-light to most people but for me it was! I have never before or since participated in or witnessed (in or out of drum corps) such a technically accurate yet breathtakingly emotional performance!!! Yes, I still say we won that one and nobody will ever convince me we didn't!!! However..."

"...You just have to include the '72 Nationals. For me though, the greatest moment of that weekend was when Guy Vezina told me we won the prelims in Hamilton that Saturday afternoon. Wow! FOUR YEARS! I don't think I'll ever forget that feeling---ever! Yeah, there were a lot of great moments that weekend but that was it for me. Then the Nationals Finals. I was happy for myself, of course, but I think I was just as glad to see some other people win...especially Paul Thompson. And the guys I marched with for 4 years who, unlike me I guess, just never seemed to give up...guys like Paul Coffey, Derek Branton, Mike Arsenault. Really, I just got off watchin' those guys!"

To our question of his most unusual experience in the corps..."This is pretty silly as an event but I suppose its pretty unusual. I was in the Grantham Corps at the time. (That in itself was pretty unusual). Anyway, we were in a contest in Sarnia and on retreat. When the announCer's about to tell ya ya just got a "52" you might as well jack around!!! Anyway, a couple of guys started staring up at the sky and pointing. The rest of us caught on pretty soon and suddenly the whole corps was looking awe-struck upward. At first the other corps just ignored us, then they began to look too! Well, I don't have to tell you its contagious. It was actually one of the wierdest things I've ever seen. Five corps down on the field, the crowd, and even the announcer peering into the sky trying to figure out what the hell was going on. As I told you, it was all pretty silly!"

"Favourite Corps?"

"I know it may sound a little odd but the Optimists really are my favourite corps! I guess I'm not the drum corps fan I once was... I'm more into different types of music. The Optimists keep me interested musically though because both Paul and Ray are very progressive thinkers on music for drum corps and we are constantly learning new aspects in our bugle line."

"Everyone knows there's a lot more to drum corps than making music and the Optimists just have to be where its at. There's just a bunch of damn-good people associated with this corps. I also think the corps has improved socially since we got the girl guard. Yes, I think there's a lot of nice kids in this band and I suppose that's really why I'm here."

"What do I like about corps?"

"If there's something missing from most musical groups I've played with, I guess its the satisfaction you get when you know you're better than someone else at what you do! I mean applause is phony and doesn't really mean a thing...hut when you have a bunch of guys out on the field trying to spot every single mistake it gets very competative and that's what I like, the competition both within the corps and from the other corps. A lot of the stock virtues about drum corps are also quite valid...you know, the comradship, travel, spotlight in the uniform etc, etc."

"There's a lot wrong with drum corps too. It requires a pretty big commitment on the part of the playing member, I mean you just can't take off when you feel like it. When there's something you really want to do and the corps may be at prectice that night, there's a hundred members to think about, so you just can't take off. It must be worth it though. I do sign up again every year. And last but

not least, while I've got the solo spot in GCC (pun) I'd like to use this article as a vehicle to thank all the people who have made life bearable for me, as an out-of-town member by taking me in, putting on the feed bag etc. over all those long weekend rehearsals over the years, people like Doug Roberts, The Burrages, The Bains, Farrels, Pryors, Fosseys, Scores and Gord Robinson...I sure hope I didn't forget to mention anyone. It really means a lot to the out-of-Toronto members to be offered a place to stay after a long day's rehearsal and knowing there's another drill coming up the next morning. Not having to always have to go back and forth to St. Catharines, London, Guelph or whatever on occasions like this really means a lot!

JIM FARRELL:

Jim first heard about drum corps when he was 12, sat in Church on Sunday morning and, glancing over the church bulletin noticed the mention of the Optimist Cadets Drum Corps and the fact that they were newly organized and accepting members in all sections of the corps, especially the bugle line, the section he was interested in. Jim joined the Cadets in October of 1967 and one year later he moved up to the Jr. Corps.

In addition to playing the bugle in the Optimists Jim also plays trumpet in the school orchestra. This year he is in the basic year

at the University of Toronto.

The highlight of Jim's years in the corps so far was winning the prelims at the "Big 10 Championships" in Hamilton on Swturday, Sept. 2nd. simply because it was the first time the corps beat Del in a

long time... Favourite corps other than the Optimists? --- None.

What does he like about drum corps as a hobby?... Those 12 minutes on the field! And what does he dislike? Grueling rehearsals, but more than that, badly planned rehearsals!

17,000 at rally hear Trudeau call Toronto 'a promised land'

Prime Minister Pierre Prindeau told a fumultions. Liberal election rally in Maile Leaf Gardens last night that his government intends to nok after the needs of Canada's big cities, and singled out Toronto as a promised land."


Sevenicen thousand jammed the Gardens to hear Trudeau while nutside in Carlton St. 4,000 more people, locked out by Liberal organizers, milled round, some of them booing.

Inside. Trude au described Toronto-whose 21 Metro ridings are critical for the Oct. 30 federal election—as "one of the great cities of North America.

"You've got a reputation as the promised land for thousands upon thousands of other Canadians, he said.

Tuesday evening, October 17th proved to be an exciting one for both the Optimist Lancers and the Jr. Corps who were features at the Federal Liberal Party Rally in Maple Leaf Gardens that evening. Both the Lancers and the Jr. Corps paraded to the Gardens from just south of Bloor St. leading a cavalcade of cars. On reaching the Gardens the Lancers continued their permormance at the main entrance outside while the Jr.Corps pushed through the crowds, with the drum line hammering through, as startled old ladies ran for cover and the younger ones held their ears.

After a short wait in a side passage the drum majors were told to get ready to move in and we heard the announcer state..."And now, Ladies and Gentlemen, the 190 piece Optimist Band..." and spotlights picked up the corps entrance from a side aisle up to the middle aise where the corps played back and forth counter march trying to space out and make 65 members look like 190. The Loaves & the Fishes bit didn't come off, but from later reports to music Director Paul Thompson, the corps sounded pretty fair from the seats around the main floor.

September 15th edition there was a more 'in depth' story by Paul Stott under the title "OPTI REGAINS CANADIAN TITLE" and his story reads, in part, as follows:

In an active Labour Day weekend of drum corps activity in Canada, the Toronto Optimists established themselves as the country's top junior corps. By winning both the "Big 10 Championships" in Hamilton on September 2nd and the Canadian National Championship the following day in Toronto, Optimists culminated a season of hard work and determination after a weak early season start.

Drum Corps Canada, following the lead of DCA and DCI held an open contest to determine next year's membership. The "Big 10" who survived the 15 corps prelim battled it out in the evening finals ... with Opti emerging as 1.1 winners over DelaSalle and the Cadets LaSalle, conceding nothing to anyone, were third. The battle lines were drawn for Nationals on the Sun- .

The quality and competitiveness of these three corps was illustrated at Nationals in what must surely be one of the closest contests in history...o.15 points separated the three finalists. Three great . performances drew standing ovations from the crowd, and it was really a toss-up as the scores attest. We were happy to see the sportsmanship shown by the runners-up to the Optimists ... and we offer our sincere congratulations to Opti, who again proved themselves a true Champion by fighting back on guts alone through a couple of poor years to regain the title they held so long. We offer congratulations too, to all competing corps for 2 enjoyable shows.

In the magazine class,"the midwest's exclusive voice of drum corps", DRUM CORPS ,Ottawa 9, Ont. KlJ 6Y5. AMERICA, FEATURED a front cover picture of . the Champion Optimists and Etobicoke Crusaders in their October edition. Inside there . were 4 full pages of pictures of the day's. events along with a complete score break- . down and an introduction story by Al Tierney covering both the Nationals and the "Big 10" Championships. We understand a more "in depth" story on Nationals will be a feature. of their November edition.

For our readers interested in getting. these publications first hand, both Drum Corps NEWS and D.C. America are now avail-

able at Whaley Royce, 310 Yonge St. (at Dundas) in Toronto. Drum Corps World, (which just has to be the most secretive publication for Canadians) 'is also an excellant newspaper BUT it 'is never on sale in Canada and, as far as we know, only a few subscribers as 'a result. Yes. Editorial!

THE WAY TO A NEW ERA IN JR. DRUM CORPS

By the time this editorial is published, one of the important sessions to effect the Jr. Corps in the United States and Canada for 1973 will have become history....that is the Rules Congress Sessions of DRUM CORPS INTERNATIONAL meetings that will have taken place in Chicago the weekend of November 10th—11th and 12th. Corps rehearsals all over the country, scheduled for that weekend, will be cancelled as instructors and executive journey to Chicago to meet on new rule changes and future operations of Jr. Corps for 1973...and into 1974.

The byline on this congress is stated as "BY drum corps, OF drum corps, FOR drum corps and for the first time the Jr. corps will meet for form its own destiny without the interference of previous years. In the senior corps scene this same thing happened with the formation of D.C.A. (Drum Corps Associates) a number of years ago.

When the question is asked, why a "Rules Congress" since the rules are already set down in the "Blue Book" of the American Legion Congress which meets with the Corps each year, this is answered with the fact that 80% of the recommendations on rules changes and interpretations are vetoed by the Legion Board when they meet after each congress and the corps have no control over this AS LONG AS THEY WORK UNDER THE AMERICAN LEGION CONGRESS of rules setup. So this year, the Jr. Corps, under the leadership of DCI will go a new route, by setting up their own rules congress that will set up the 1973 DCI rules as based on the 1972 rules which in turn were based on the 1971 Legion rules as amended by DCI.

Some of the proposals for consideration at this first congress are:

1. Allot points to the captions relative to the contribution of each caption to the total show. This would take into consideration the training required to field the players in that caption, the total number in that caption and the method of judging that caption.

- Allow performances of one or more 'non-difficult" musical selections without loss of credit in content analysis caption.
- 3. Consider entering the field over the sidelines from 3 sides up to the 25 yd.line.
- 4. Possibly reapportionate the points allotted to "Opinion" vs. "Execution."
- 5. New GE/MM sheet setup.
- 6. Graduated penalties for "time-in-motion" and other timing penalties.
- 7. De-emphasize noncontributing judgeable areas such as heels at the halt by lib-eralizing the parameters that describe the errors.
- 8. Increase the kind and numbers of allowable sticks as carried by leg drummers.
- 9. Allow other percussion instruments.

The above nine items will be discussed plus any other items brought to the congress by any participant.

This could be the final chapter in the "Drum Corps Declaration Of Independence."...especially for Junior Corps.


To what extent proposals are put forth, agreed on and passed will certain-

effect the Jr. corps picture in 1973. We hope, that in addition to the many corps represented the Chief Judges for each Association will also be there as they will have the duty of enforcing these new rules by educating and informing all the judges in each Association of these new changes and interpretations. In addition, the many instructors, who, for one reason or another will not be in Chitago for this DCI seminar deserve to get complete information as quickly as possible for the final preparation of their corps 1973 shows.

Other questions come up. To what degree will these changes be used by the Jr. Corps? And what will happen to the American Legion Congress. Will the DCI Nationals title replace the VFW and American Legion titles in the United States as the top Championship title of the year? This Championship title is the final chapter in the continuing story of the development of Jr. Corps activity in North America...I say North America because as the American rules are set up so follow the Canadian corps.

In this regard the CDCA (Canadian Drum Corps Assoc.) have set up their seminar in Kingston, Ontario to review the DCI Congress, educate the judges present and all instructors from every corps in Canada as to the 1973 changes. In addition full reports on the 1973 congress as to drill, bugle and percussion sections will be reported in full in published reports available to all corps in the CDCA.

The results of both seminars should be most interesting.


