

To start off the "Cadets page" this issue, here is an article given to us that we found very interesting. What do you think?....

I was asked to write an article about drum corps in general, and about the good and bad things about them. I, myself have seen a lot of drum corps even though I was in one only a short while. Everyone in my family have been involved with a corps at some time.

My brother was in the Optimist Jr. Corps for five years and my other brother was the drum major for the Cadets when they were first starting out. My father was once the Director of the Cadets too, and my sister was in a drum corps once. I have seen both the Cadets and the Jr. corps grow and change over the years.

It is a fantastic and rewarding feeling marching in a corps, after all the hours spent in perfecting a drill. In travelling around you get the chance to show your skills by competing against other corps. A lot of people have never heard of a drum corps before, but when they see a show for the first time they really get interested and involved in watching. You have to learn to know all the corps and the better you get to know what each corps is like the more exciting it becomes. They play what we the audience want to hear.

I have only one thing against all drum corps: the amount of time required from each and every individual in order to participate in it fully. There is a lot of pressure put on drum corps, especially when it comes time to compest. This is not true so much in the lower divisions, but it is very true in Junior "A" Corps.

I think this pressure takes a lot of fun out of drum corps. I know everyone wants to win and that working at it is the only way possible, but I think all drum corps of the Junior "A" category stress it too strongly. If you want to be in a drum corps, you almost have to make a career out of it. That is fine for a lot of people, but I bet the drum corps would have a lot more members if it was not so demanding. But again, maybe that is the only way to win. It was for that very reason that I could no longer remain in the drum corps I was in. Along with the members in the corps, the executive and the instructors have to make it a second job as well.

I think that if this one fault could be changed, that the drum corps world would be even more appealing to a lot more people.

At the September meeting of the Corps Executive a number of changes were made on the Executive and Instruction level for the upcoming year.

The corps had their backs against the wall and only a few had the guts and desire to stick it out. Girls were pulled from the colour guard and people were brought in "off the street".

The corps withdrew from the first show because they were not ready.

A.jax:

The next scheduled contest was Ajax but the corps couldn't pull out of another; not with the Canadian Classic but a week away. The corps, still unprepared, found themselves rehearsing in the morning rain and travelled to Ajax without knowing if the contest was still being held.

Taking advantage of the weather, the corps secured a field and finished the closeing number. A steady drizzle followed a short downpour and the corps took their position on the ready line. The score reflected that the performance was rough, somespots bad, and lacked any polish.

The corps found themselves in second until a last minute change dropped them into third, beneath Seneca.

The day of the Classic began in fine form with a Joe Giana. Spagetti festival parade. Practise commenced later at Weston and Lawrence so Oxenham could sneak off for a coffee when no one was watching. The rehearsal carried on till after 5 and the bugle line showed signs of fatigue.

The corps was given an hour to stuff their faces and make their way over to CNE stadium where they would compete with the best of the west, midwest and east.

The drumline faired quite well after beating De La Salle's the week before and defeated some of the bigger lines. The hornline failed to project sufficently into the stands and did a bad overall show. The guard was sloppy along with the M & M. The main goal, how ever, was to beat Princemen, which they did, but mainly due to the drum score. The bugles were still behind.

Quebec:

Warden subway station parking lot was filled with eager corpsmembers about to set out to the land of make believe, Quebec, early Saturday morning. Following numerous coffee's and a debut of new corps jackets, the buses were straightened away and sent rolling up the 401 to unrealistic scoreland.

Upon arrival in Ste. Jerome by mid-afternoon the executive

granted corpsmembers time to eat! The restaurants were few and overcrowded. The biggest problem was trying to get the orders straight.

June was the rainy month this year and this day was no exception. It precipitated periodically throughout the days rehearsal and after getting dressed the corps made its way over to the swamp..er..field.

We managed to pull off the highest execution bugle score of the year at this show; 14.2. Of course, being indoors had a lot to do with it.

After such an elating victory we were overjoyed to find that the fan in the gymnasium where we were to sleep didn't work. To top this off, the lights would not go out and the doors wouldn't open. The next morning the corps motored over to Verdun, once the home of the A Jr. C Championships.

While waiting for the truck to arrive, the stage was set for a bloody, most

Although we couldn't blame it, it became a little uncomfortable for the rest of the trip with the entire corps on one school bus. Drawing second last, we had time for a good warmup until an intoxicated member of the University society felt a strong desire to air his views on drum corps from a window of one of the residences. After

Arriving at the University of Toledo early Sat., the corps members were set into luxury-status rooms at four to a room.

Two of the local natives decided to drop in on our horn rehearsal and was followed by a disgusting dinner. Even more disgusting was that our food would be on par all weekend.

Drill rehearsal went as usual and in accordance of the bad rehearsals we've been having the week before. The corps was awarded the rest of the night off after drill but there was little to do around the University. Before leaving to the finals the spirit was back to normal. The corps has suffered too many hardships through it's long and successful history to fall apart now.

Preparations were on the way for DCI North and the DCI's as the corps pulled together. Larry Blandford, Mike Arsnault and former Optimists drum major, Vern Johansson, spoke to the corps. Following the talk were slides dating back to '58 through to the 74 corps. As dawn broke the following morning the corps was awaken 45 minutes before the scheduled time, by Hawthorne Cula. Everyone being in cheery spirits, the corps devoured various types of cereal and moved to the drill field for basics and short drill rehearsal. During free time given till five, many of the people watched Santa Clara go through their paces.

Getting up for the show is one thing, but becoming hyper is another. The kids blew their mind, and the show with it. Execution dropped because many were unable to control the performance level.

* D.C.I. Championships:

If there ever was such a place called drum corps city, it would have been Ithaca during the three day championships. It was well past 3 a.m. when the buses slipped down the mountain side to the base of the finger lake.

The mornings rehearsal was uniformed and involved doing the show twice. It may have been a longer practise but for some dudes who were using our field. The show was much better than the disaster in Toledo but still was missing something. Despite the improvment of the corps the score remained the same 64. Most corpsmembers felt we wouldn't make finals but none suspected that we would place so low. We finished as the 34 corps in North America. Somewhat disheartened, we returned to the University rooms.

We were given time to stuff our faces with not bad food, which was for the hospital and University circles, unusual. The afternoon's activities comprised of an effective two hour drill session and then the corps was given the night off and a party later.

A longer practise ensued

the field. It ended with the
news of De La Salle scoring an
84 prelim score.

The night finals were great displays of professionalism and drum corps, with Santa Clara Vanguard retaining their '74 title. The corps spent the night in Ithaca and departed the Ivy League town early Sunday morning.

TITUSVILLE:

Once again it was time for the Optimists yearly jaunt down to the Grease capital of the world. Chains, knives, and troops were loaded aboard the bus for the annual "Greaseball Follies", but we were fooled! The greasers didn't show

The greasers didn't show up. They must have tired of the game and gone home to their wives and kids.

We defeated Etobicoke by approx. 11 points and our small hornline came close to that of Purple Lancers, one of the new D.C.I. members carrying over 45 horns.

This contest put the corps in good spirits for the Nationals weekend ahead. We finished third behind Watkins Glen Squires and Purple Lancers of Auburn.

THE NATIONALS WEEKEND:

In three days the season would be over. The corps gathered at Union station on a hazy morning, which turned to rain, as the corps buses wheeled from Union's front porch. Although no one spoke of what was ahead, there was a feeling of confidence and the weekend was in the minds of everyone. After settling in the gymnasium of the London Ontario School for the Deaf, the buses carried the corps to Fanshaw College to endulge in some serious eating. The dinners were fine, done well, however, the lunches were ghastly! Rehearsal followed and was highlighted by the drumlines rendition of "I'm A Man". Many remembered it from the '71 Nationals at Porter Stadium when the line went swimming after the show.

That evening we approached the stadium with pure excitement!

Seneca Princemen and the Crusaders had been working with Del's instructors and Mike Duffy for weeks. It was near the time when the results of this would be seen. The corps entered the stadium and it seemed as if it were the Black Pit of London. It was dark. We knew there were people out there somewhere; we could hear them breathing. The drumline put on an excellent effort but the hornline seemed to manufacture mistakes. Mistakes that hadn't been made for months appeared.

We won the show by three points, however, which added

to our confidence and realisation of the work the hornline must do in one day.

The corps stayed in London that night and the following day was spent on the drill field, and in sections. All the rehearsing that could be done now was done and the corps boardered the buses for Toronto.

The day of Nationals had finally arrived and the buses rolled down the 401 to Toronto which seemed to take longer than any time before.

Upon arriving in Toronto we were released at the Six Points Plaza to endulge in gastronomical replenishment.

The buses then pulled into a convent for what we thought was a last minute prayer session, however, in behind the building was a field on which we went through our paces for the last time this year.

The smell of Autumn was in the air and the sky was overcast. After a short but brisk rehearsal we left for the Shrine Hall which were to be the change rooms. We had plenty of time to dress and the brass engaged in a good long warm-up.

The weather grew more ominous and it was beginning to drizzle. By the time the corps pulled into C.N.E. parking lot, it was pouring.

The corps huddled together under the stands for some last minute instructions and the pre=National speach.



The Garbage Pail

When drum corps first began, it started as a hobby. The members would go to rehearsal once a week and do a parade or band tattoo on Saturdays. For this small effort the corpsman would receive his bus fare and a small token for a beer or two after his rehearsal.

Today the drum corps scene is totally different! The juniors were born and haven't stopped growing since that initiation into the corps world. Anyone who can call drum corps a hobby today is out of his gourd ! Drum corps is now a way of life!

Scenic crusers motor the continent on month long tours and rehearsals are held three and four nights a week. But with this progression comes the major problems. Budgets, energy shortages, membership problems, equipment, and... The Drum Corps Work Syndrome !

The drum corps work syndrome as I refer to it, is the conflict between the corps and the marching members! In order for drum corps to go on extended tours, it must have a full turnout from it's members! But in order for the corps members to survive they need MONEY !!! It cost quite a bit to belong to a corps today, with dues and out of town meals. Even transportation to practise can add up to a tidy sum.

So where is the money to come from ? Obviously the corps cannot afford to pick up the meal tab. With the budgets corps need to function today, that would be impossible! In observing the situation I have broken the members into four categories.

One; The Kid, This corpsmember we need not worry about in this particular situation. He is usually under 16 and is sponsored by his parents.
Two; The Conmen, These are the
members the are over 16 and still have their corps activities paid for by their parents. They are often heard to say to their parents, "Aww gee ma! If I have to go to work in a factory I'll never be able to draw again!

Three; The Drum Corps Bum, These members survive through out all ages of the corps! Without parential supplementation, and no visible means of support these drum corps nuts do nothing but drum corps and survive the summer on chips and coke! Where do they get their money ? Card games on the bus and mooching. The Fourth type and the one this article is mainly concerned with is the workee. They are usually over 16, without parential support, and must work in order to obtain funds to remain in the corps. Often the two come into conflict.

Problems arise when most of todays jobs require shift work and working weekends. It often occours that people who get jobs

so that they may be able to stay in the corps, often leave the corps to keep the job! Then there are the workees that are fortunate enough to get 9-5 jobs. They rush home from work, gobble down dinner and go off to rehearsal for three to four hours! Their problem arises when the tours come up and are unable to get off work, however many would have been able to if employers had been given sunstantial prenotification.

In our efforts to provide a working solution for persons with these problems, the staff of the Garbage Pail have come up with a few solutions!

One; Work all winter and save enough to last the summer, and go on unemployment.

Two: Lower the age limit to 16, then no one will have to work!

Three; The Chuster Method; Temporarily leave the corps because of lack of funds and then have your parents take you to a corps rehearsal; look restless and sorrowful, hands in pockets rub eyes occasionally, walk back and forth in front of the corps) and keep repeating, "If only I had the money to go back to the corps." Also pay five or six of the corps members to nag your parents to get you back into the corps! If you old lady, or mother if preferred, is like mine, you'll be set up in drum corps for life!

Robert Trimble


The members in the Optimists corps today are not getting the benefits we in the earlier year s received through high discip-line, said 21 year old Robert Trimble of the guard.

In his last marching year, Rob recalls his career with great gusto and stated that he has never been initiated, (and didn't miss it). Mr. Trimble joined The Optimists in 1968 and marched secondary banner. He remembers his rookie year easily and relates it verbally as his best year in the corps, although the most difficult.

He notes that he has never done anything that he could have gotten in trouble for, and plans to continue with the corps into the future. "The corps is everything I have, he explained, it's a way of life."

Next year, Rob will be Greg's number two man on the M & M field. Among his accomplishments in the corps, he is the last male recipient of Guard sman of the year award which he obtained in 1971. A few memorable moments of his marching years are 72 Nationals, where the corps won number 12, his promotion to guard sgt. in Ottawa of '71, and Nationals of 1969, where the corps ended an era.

He became interested in joining a corps when his parents took him to the season opener at Borough of York Stadium in 69. At that time he liked De La Salle



's uniforms and wished to join the corps. His mother, being a staunch green follower, however, swayed him to try the Optimists on for size, and he stayed.

Being a member of the 69 male guard, Rob was asked to compare the girls of today to the male guard members of the early 70's.

"We could have kept the guys guard because we had 18 members when it was disbanded, but the girls today are better.

GREASE FOUNDATION REPORT


It was reported that during Dapers meeting with the President, the President was overheard to say, "Sorry Don, but it's either you or me!"


